




God Chastening His People The people complained and God sent fire to chasten them (11:1–3).

It is worthy of notice, however, that the discontent seems to have been confined to the extremities of the camp, where, in all likelihood, "the mixed multitude" [see on Ex 12:38] had their station.	

Mixed multitude (Ex. 12:38), a class who accompanied the Israelites as they journeyed from Rameses to Succoth, the first stage of the Exodus. These were probably miscellaneous hangers-on to the Hebrews, whether Egyptians of the lower orders, or the remains of the Hyksos as some think. The same thing happened on the return of the Jews from Babylon (Neh. 13:3), a "mixed multitude" accompanied them so far.	
Mixed Multitude does not necessarily refer to people who were mixed by blood. This reference is to a group (multitude) of people who were of different nationalities (mixed) than Israel. These people had also been slaves in Egypt but when Israel left in the Exodus, they followed.	
The complaining likely begin among the mixed multitude and the children of Israel who were in the "uttermost parts" (outskirts) of the camp. It would have been common for this group to stand back from the rest of the crowd and normally this crowd is the first to complain.
